Over this past year, I have felt—perhaps as many of you have—that the world seems to be splitting down the middle. Lines are drawn everywhere: conservative and liberal, right and left, one nation against another, even differences among the faithful within our own Church.

Even within parishes, we see division: some kneel in reverence, others stand in devotion, yet both are acts of love for the Lord. And still, our human weakness turns these differences into reasons for separation. Politics and social debates creep into our families and friendships, leaving hearts wounded and relationships strained.

We are not only witnesses to this division; at times, we are participants in it—through our words, our posts online, or the judgments we form in our hearts. But as Catholic women and men, and as members of the Catholic Women's League, we are called to something greater.



As your CWL Antigonish Diocesan Social Justice Chair, I want to encourage you to continue to advocate for the return of a blood donor clinic in the CBRM. Our Antigonish Diocesan Resolution, 2025.01 Provision of a Blood Donation Service for the Cape Breton Regional Municipality, inspired by Earlene Landry, and researched by members, was adopted at diocesan and provincial conventions and forwarded to national CWL to go to all provinces to be used where applicable. The resolution urges Canadian Blood Services, in collaboration with community partners, to provide a blood donation service for the Cape Breton Regional Municipality.



Now our action comes into play and your parish help is needed.

Action Plan: Provision of a Blood Donation Service for the Cape Breton Regional Municipality

- 1. Encourage CWL members to write letters to Canadian Blood Services to support action on the resolution.
- 2. Raise awareness of the resolution to gather support from parishioners, community members and community partners.
- 3. Encourage members to write letters to the premier, provincial minister of health, local MLAs, Cape Breton Regional Municipality mayor and councilors urging support of the resolution.
- 4. Monitor Canadian Blood Services' response to the resolution. (Let us know if you get responses)

Against Human Trafficking

Many influences have impacted this newsletter. In September I attended the Provincial – Diocesan CWL Executive Retreat in Amherst. At Saturday Mass at Holy Family Church, I picked up a leaflet made by their CWL council about the White Ribbon Campaign against Human Trafficking and Child Pornography. What a thoughtful and well-done leaflet! I did get permission and will try to make it available for use in December's campaign. While travelling back from the Amherst CWL Provincial Retreat we stopped at the Alma Truck Stop. This notice was on their poster board. Clicking on the QR code with your cell phone will take you to the NS RCMP site and information on the Human Trafficking Unit. Human Trafficking Hotline (1-833-900-1010).

It was brought to my attention that Highway 104 was a major corridor out of the province for trafficking teens and young adults. Apparently, Nova Scotia has the highest rate of trafficking in Canada. Many of the youth, male and female, runaways are being groomed and eventually moved out

of the province to Ontario or out west to Alberta and BC.

Learn more about human trafficking and support the Joy Smith Foundation at https://joysmithfoundation.com. Support transition houses, for example, Willow House, CB that specialize in domestic and sexualized violence support.

The White Ribbon Campaign is on December 6th on National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women. In her fall memo, Madonna Clark, National Chairperson of Service, mentions that a seminar on Intimate Partner Violence from UNB professor Dr. Cathy Holtmann is being finalized. She encourages us to host guest speakers on domestic violence and to promote awareness of the White Ribbon Campaign.

As the leaves transfer their colour from green to vibrant yellow, oranges, reds, one may think of changing home decor from summer to fall.

As we enter sweater weather, out come the sweaters, chunky knit throws and faux fur throws.

As we decorate, we bring in dried branches or leaves, pinecones, acorns and chestnuts and decorate our house with fall colours. We also fill our homes with the scents of fresh baked bread, apple and pumpkin pie. These bring out the wonderful smell of cinnamon.

One of my favourite cookie recipes that I would like to share with you is:

Nova Scotia Ginger Molasses Cookies

(They are soft, chewy, and perfectly spiced and makes the kitchen smell wonderful)

2 ½ cup flour

2 tsp ground ginger

1 tsp cinnamon

½ tsp ground cloves

½ tsp salt

2 tsp baking soda

3/4 c unsalted butter (softened)

1 cup white sugar

1 egg

1/4 cup molasses

Preheat oven 350. Line baking tray with parchment paper.

Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy.

Mix in egg and molasses until smooth.

Mix dry ingredients. Stir into wet ingredients until soft dough forms.

Roll into 1-inch balls and roll in sugar. Lightly flatten with fork.

Bake 8-10 minutes until just set.

Cool, leave on tray for 2 minutes before transferring to wire rack.

Note: They don't last long at my house.

LIFE MEMBERS' CORNER



Have you heard the acronym WUCWO and wondered what it means? WUCWO stands for the World Union of Catholic Women's Organizations, "united in mission, transforming lives", which was formed in 1910. Today, it boasts being active on five continents, in more than fifty countries, with over 100 organizations and more than eight million members! As members of The Catholic Women's League of Canada, one of the over 100 organizations, we are all members. The CWL of Canada joined WUCWO in 1921.

WUCWO describes their mission in this way, "We promote the integral development and formation of women, and their participation in all areas of ecclesial and social life, encouraging them to fully live out their Christian vocation and commitment to the world." They have always defended life and family.

They describe their vision in these words, "We aspire for Catholic women to be active protagonists in the Church and in society, collaborating in the construction of a more just and humane world, through the witness of their faith and their concrete commitment."

The General Assembly is the highest governing body of WUCWO. In June 2023, Monica Santamarina was elected President General.

The North American Region includes Canada and the United States. Three organizations/groups are from Canada: The CWL of Canada, the Ukrainian CWL of Canada and the Sisters of Providence. Two are from the United States: Knights of Peter Claver Ladies Auxiliary and the National Council of Catholic Women (NCCW).

The Board Member from Canada at the present time is Honourary Life Member Barbara Dowding. As a Board Member she serves a four-year term.

In 2021, WUCWO created the World Women's Observatory (WWO) to give visibility to the most vulnerable women and contribute to foster their integral development.

The North American Regional Assembly was held in Toronto in August this year, one day prior to the CWL National Convention/Annual Meeting of Members. North American Vice President Barbara Dowding chaired the Assembly. Special guest was the President General Monica Santamarina who addressed the gathering. A presentation was given by Leah Watkins who spoke of the plight of migrant workers in Canada. Three suggestions she gave for us to help are: host the Migrant Worker Exercise (a 1½ - 2 hr. workshop); advocate for open work permits and permanent resident status on arrival, and support local migrant rights groups.

A feather in the hat of The CWL of Canada is the WUCWO Endowment Fund. This was established in 2000 by the efforts of Honourary Life Member Claire Heron. The fund's purpose was to have funds generated by interest to help members of WUCWO, who did not have the financial means, to attend Board meetings and assemblies. Some of our councils in the Diocese of Antigonish contributed to the Endowment Fund. It was incorporated as a registered charity in 2008.

2024-2025 was an eventful year for the St. Ninian Parish Catholic Women's League. In keeping with our threefold mission of faith, service and social justice, our members created and supported many different initiatives. A highlight was the organization of the Diocesan Annual Convention held at St. Ninian Place in April 2025. Our members also organized social events, such as a meal for the Clergy of the Diocese on the occasion of the Mass of Chrism and receptions for our communion and confirmation candidates and their families.

Members also continued their support to grieving families through prayers at funeral homes and funeral receptions. On the social justice front, our members continued to monitor policy developments and through fundraising efforts donated
